The Krooners travelled to Knaphill on the back of two defeats, hoping to get back to winning ways.

Just over 10 minutes in, Camberley came agonisingly close to taking the lead. A deep corner from Adam Aziz caused chaos in the Knaphill area. Jamie Hoppitt had his shot charged down, followed by Mikey Milchev-Szczepaniak's effort being blocked by a knee on the line.

Hoppitt would be involved again 2 minutes later, a deflected shot fell onto his head, however, he couldn't keep the ball below the crossbar.

In the 15th minute, Knaphill took the lead. A powerful strike at goal forced Dom West into a smart save, unfortunately the rebound fell to Sid Cannon who made no mistake from 6-yards to put the hosts into the lead.

Once again, Jamie Hoppitt created problems for the Knappers defence. A looping cross from Aziz was tipped away awkwardly by Harvey Keogh. Once again, the ball landed on Hoppitt's head. Once again, his effort was denied on the line superbly by Tom Wensley.

The hosts doubled their lead on the half hour mark. A miskewed clearance by Jacob Wheeler in the area landed at the feet of Bradley Sweeney who finished into the bottom left corner. The hosts seemed to be in control of the game. A superb team move brought the Krooners back into the game in the 37th minute. West claimed a corner well, bowling the ball to Aziz. His switch found Hoppitt in acres of space, allowing him to deliver a smart cross into the box. Knaphill appeared to have dealt with the danger, but Aziz won the ball back well, exchanging passes with Archie Mills before gliding past his man and curling the ball into the top right hand corner to half the deficit.

The Krooners regained parity just before the break. Hayden Stedman floated a lovely ball into the box, Stan Pickup flicked the ball well to Mckenzie Clayton. The captain made no mistake to smash home a deserved equaliser.

There was still time for West to pull off an outstanding save to keep the scores level. Thomas Harland-Goddard turned well on the edge of the box, and his curling effort looked destined for the top corner. West miraculously got both hands to the ball, pushing it over the crossbar and to safety. The game was level at 2-2 going into half time.

A thunderous effort from Stedman almost gave the Krooners the lead minutes into the second half, however, the ball kissed the top of the crossbar and flew to safety for the Knappers.

Knaphill retook the lead with 15 minutes remaining. A long ball was not dealt with, allowing Maurice Black a chance in the area. He took the chance well, finishing well to West's right.

The scoring was not done yet. In the 88th minute, Luke Rippon's long throw was flicked on by Hoppitt, with the ball being flicked again by Josh Hooks. This set Milchev-Szczepaniak charging down on goal. He held his man off well and fired excellently low to Keogh's right to bring the game level again.

Entering the dying embers of added time, the points seemed to be destined to be shared. That was before Luke Ifil picked up the ball and delivered an inch perfect ball onto the head of Hoppit again. His header crashed off the post, much to the despair of the travelling contingency. Thankfully, Milchev-Szczepaniak hadn't stopped his run into the area. He beat his defender to the ball as it was rolling excruciatingly along the goalline and tapped home, sending all those of a Camberley persuasion delirious.

The full time whistle blew shortly after, sealing the full three points for the Krooners. A crazy game, with an even better ending brought to an end Camberley's losing run. The Krooners are back at home against a strong Redhill side on Saturday.

Redevelopment


For those of you who may not have heard we have finally got the approval for the development of the ground.

The club was established in 1895 after a discussion at St Michael's church, and was originally named St Michael's Foot-ball Club, although they became known as St Michael's, Camberley. The first match, a friendly, was played on 16 October against D Company from the Royal Military College in nearby Sandhurst, St Michael's won 4–2. In January 1896 they joined the Surrey County Football Association, entering and winning the Surrey Junior Cup in 1897–98; the club's first competitive game was played on 16 October 1897, a Junior Cup first round match against Farncombe which St Michael's won 5–2. After winning the cup, the club joined the East & West Surrey League for the 1898–99 season.

In January 1901 a public meeting was held, at which it was decided to establish a new club that would absorb both St Michael's and Camberley Magpies. The name Camberley & Yorktown was adopted and the club took St Michael's place in the East & West Surrey League. However, they dropped into the Aldershot Combination in 1902, before switching to the Ascot & District League in 1903. The club finished as runners-up in their first season and went on to win the league in 1904–05. They were runners-up again in 1905–06, before winning a hat-trick of successive titles in 1907–08, 1908–09 and 1909–10, remaining unbeaten throughout the third of the title-winning seasons. The season also saw them win the Surrey Junior Cup for a second time, beating Sutton United 2–0 in the final. In 1910 Camberley & Yorktown returned to the East & West Surrey League, which had been renamed the West

Surrey League. In 1912–13 the club also entered the three-club Aldershot Senior Civilian League, which they won. They went on to win the West Surrey League the following season.

In 1922 Camberley & Yorktown were founder members of the Surrey Senior League. They won three successive titles in 1930 –31, 1931–32 and 1932–33 and were runners-up in 1938–39. After World

Successive titles in 1930 –31, 1931–32 and 1932–33 and were runners-up in 1938–39. After World War II the club was renamed Camberley, and were Surrey Senior League runners-up in 1946–47, before winning the league's Charity Cup in 1951–52 with a 4–3 win over Chertsey Town. The club were league runners-up again in 1961–62, and adopted their current name on 2 June 1967 after merging with former Parthenon League club

Camberley Wanderers. In 1973 they joined the Spartan League, but left to join Division Two of the Athenian League in 1975. In 1977 they switched to Division Two of the Isthmian League, and were promoted to Division One after finishing as Division Two runners-up in 1978–79. Two seasons later they were relegated, and after a single season back in Division Two, they rejoined the Athenian League, which now had a single division.

In 1983 Rick Wakeman became the club's chairman while he was living in Camberley. He remained in this post until 1986 when he was elected Vice-President, and left the club when he moved to the Isle of Man in 1988. In 1984 the Athenian League disbanded; Camberley rejoined the Isthmian League and were placed in Division Two South, where they remained until being placed in Division Three following league reorganisation in 1991. In 1998–99 the club reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time. Drawn against away to Third Division Brentford, they lost 5–0. Division Three became Division Two in 2002, and Camberley remained members until the end of the 2005–06 season, when they dropped into the Premier Division of the Combined Counties League through the FA's re-structuring of non-league football. They were runners-up in the division in 2013–14 and 2014–15.

They came third in the 2015-16 season in the North division of the Combined counties league 2016-17 saw a sixth place finish and seventh the season after. 2018-19 saw a sixteenth place finish and with the 2019-20 season not finishing and the 2020-21 one not even starting due to covid, they started the 2021-22 season in the Combined Counties Premier Division South and Manager Luke Turkington oversaw a twelfth place finish on 44 points. 2022-23 Season was an improvement on the previous finishing tenth with 52 Points, with a fantastic run of 1 defeat in the last 14 league games of the season, that was at a time when games were coming thick and fast as the season had to be extended by 2 weeks to make up for the bad weather earlier in the campaign. 2023-24 & 2024-25 were disappointing seasons which were entered into with the hope to push on from the prior years and maybe see if we could get in the top 5 for the playoffs. 2025-26 We go again.

GROUND

In 1898 the club started playing at the new Recreation Ground on London Road, although they also used a pitch near Southwell Park Road when the Recreation Ground was unavailable and had moved there permanently by 1905. They played there until moving to Martin's Meadow in 1909. However, when the tenancy came to an end, the club returned to the Recreation Ground.

Since 1923 the club have played at Krooner Park on Wilton Road. The ground was paid for with the winnings of a horse named Krooner who won two races at Haydock Park Racecourse in 1920.

It was officially opened on 22 December 1923. Due to financial difficulties Krooner Park was sold back to the local council in 1939 with the council guaranteeing that the ground would be retained in perpetuity and that it would be rented to the football club, giving them priority whilst they remained in existence. In the mid-1960s the club asked thee council to leave Krooner Park and build a new ground at South- cote Park Farm, but the request was rejected due to the amount of engineering that would be required.

Floodlights were installed at the ground in 1974, with the first floodlit match being a friendly against Crystal Palace on 14 October. The attendance at the match, which ended in a 1–1 draw, was around 3,100, a ground record. The highest confirmed attendance at Krooner Park was 2,066 when the newly-formed Aldershot Town visited for an Isthmian League Division Three match on 10 November 1992.

Fleet Town

Formed: 1890



Fleet Town FC was officially formed in 1890, making it the oldest sports club in the town. The centenary was celebrated in 1990 with a special Scroll being presented by the Football Association to the club, together with a commemorative plague from the Hampshire FA. In its early years Fleet FC played at the bottom of the Views where Campbells Close is today. Later they moved to Watsons Meadow in Fleet Road, roughly opposite where Travis & Perkins now stands, at the station end of Fleet Road. It was during this time that a young, future Prime Minister, Clement Atlee played for the club, his aunt living in a house that backed onto this original ground. In 1923 Lord Calthorpe of Elvetham Hall made available the site of the present ground in Crookham Road, and the club moved to its new home playing their first match on 3rd March 1923. The ground was subsequently bequeathed to the District Council and later the Fleet Town Council, with the proviso that it would continue to be for the use of the Town's football club. In 1953 floodlights were installed for the first time. The club entered the Hampshire League in 1961. From then on Fleet Town FC gradually moved through the Divisions, eventually moving into the Wessex League for the 1989/90 season. After six years of steady progress, the club gained promotion to the Southern League as Wessex League Champions. In 1999/00, its fifth season in the Dr Martens Southern League the club finished bottom and returned to the Wessex League. Within a few seasons the club returned to the Southern League, winning promotion under Player/manager, Steve Beeks. Playing in the Ryman League the 2005/06 season began with a new management team of ex-England International Andy Sinton assisted by Steve Mellor. In their second season together this new team saw their side top the table at Christmas before they finally finished in 5th place. In a pulsating play-off semi-final they lost 2-1 to Tooting & Mitcham, with the London side scoring twice in added-on time. The team also reached the final of the Hampshire County Cup, losing 2-1 to Aldershot, the game being played at AFC Bournemouth. For season 2007-08 the Club were moved by the FA to the BGB Southern League, South & West Division, and again had a record breaking season. Right up until the last few games they were in with a chance of automatic promotion but eventually had to accept 2nd spot behind Farnborough. This however was their highest ever non-league finish and again played in front of record crowds. It was heartbreak in the play-offs though as the team again lost in the semi-final, this time to an injury time penalty that gave Uxbridge a 2-1 victory. Fleet also went their furthest in the FA Cup before losing 2-1 at Hayant & Waterlooville in the 3rd Qualifying Round. Season 08/09 had the club on the move yet again with promotions/relegations elsewhere meaning that Fleet returned to the Ryman League, South Division. Andy Sinton's side again broke more records as the team won four cups, including the prestigious Hampshire Senior Cup when over 1,200 witnessed victory over VTFC at St Marys Stadium, Southampton, to fleet town fc a brief history today's visitors send the cup to Fleet for the first time. In addition the team also won the Russell Cotes Cup, Aldershot Senior & North Hants cups. They again progressed to the 3rd Qualifying Round of the FA Cup before losing 5-2 in a bruising encounter at AFC Totton. May 2010 brought major changes at the club with Chairman Graham Smith stepping down and this was shortly followed by manager Andy Sinton resigning to join AFC Telford United.

For the new season Steve Mellor stepped into the Manager's shoes. A largely new Blues side finished a credible 13th. Season 2011-12 again saw Fleet Town move as they were switched back to the Southern League after a three year absence, this time placed in the Division One Central. However results were poor and after a run of defeats and exiting the major cup competitions Mellor left in November 2011 to be replaced by Craig Davis as player/manager. Despite some improved displays, the Blues faced relegation after ending the season in 21st spot. However, due to circumstances elsewhere in the Football pyramid Fleet Town gained an FA reprieve and retained their place as a Southern League club, to play a 2nd season in the Division One Central for season 2012/13. In July 2012 Steve Cantle became Chairman and the club enjoyed an improved Southern League season, finishing with 4 teams behind them, in 18th spot. Following the end of the season Fleet Town were again moved, this time within the Southern League to Division One South & West. After several difficult seasons the 2015/16 season saw Fleet moved back to the Division One Central, and they enjoyed 3 successful seasons with league status retained and the winning of the Aldershot Senior Cup and the North Hants Senior Cup in 2017. However, 2018-19, Fleet's 17th consecutive season at this level, brings new challenges to the Club as against their wishes, they have been laterally moved to the Southern League South with long journeys ahead including two to Devon. With Chairman Alec Grant at the helm the Club is moving forward and getting the infrastructure right and as a result the feeling at the Club is one of optimism. Sam Waters is the new Head of Football with Dave Kelly as manager and with their reliance on youth the Club are looking for stability and progress after the turmoil of the close season. A very tough season with multiple managers and chairpeople led to little consistency. 2019-20 started with Fleet back in the Wessex League Premier Division after relegation from the Southern League South Division. Moving forward a new committee is in place and with Dave Kelly continuing as manager and many players returning it is hoped that much of the consistency lacking from last year will be in place this year. The team were solidly in midtable when covid caused an end to the season. The club focussed on rebuilding the club infrastructure, with much work taking place on the pitch, in the clubhouse and around the ground, 2020-21 saw a second season in the Wessex League. Dave Kelly remained as manager and the team kicked on with new players, still with a focus on developing young players. The team reached the 1st Rd of the FA Vase for the first time in many years. Work on the ground continued and the future is starting to look better at Calthorpe Park. With the FA's reorganisation taking place over the summer Fleet moved leagues yet again and for 2021- 22 played in the Combined Counties Premier League Southern Division. At the start of 2022-23 we created our "community club". Then with Dave Kelly departing late in 2022, the club appointed a new manager, Jermaine McGlashan to take over the first team. Jermaine was given the task of keeping the club at step 5. After many ups and downs, finally on April 26th our safety at step 5 was confirmed. During the close season a new squad was built for the 2023-24 season and has had a reasonable start seeing the club around mid-table in mid-October. Jermaine departed to manage fellow league side AFC Croydon Athletic and the club appointed Elliott Hunt as first team manager. Elliott started well with three league wins from five and was able to guide the club to a comfortable midtable finish with a late charge for the play-offs only being derailed by a raft of injuries. Hopes are high for further progression for the 24/25 season following wise player recruitment & we look forward to seeing the progress of this great group of players. Elliott is now joined by joint manager Darryl Evans & coaches Luke Barron and Charlie Clapham along with Head of Medical & Performance Gary Lewis.
