Krooners 0 - 1 Jersey Bulls

18th February 2025

17th tackled 3rd at Krooner Park, with both teams needing a positive result for differing reasons,

The first half began with Jersey threatening the most. Jersey's Toby Ritzema found space on the edge of the area, crossing for Jonny Le Quesne to fire an attempt at goal, this being claimed by Camberley goalkeeper Dom West. Jersey would have another chance to score within the opening 10 minutes. Rai Dos Santos attempted a free kick from 25 yards, ultimately sending it high and wide over the fencing behind the goal.

Jersey dominated the majority of the first half, however neither team launched any meaningful attacks until the 30th minute. Ellis McLean drove forward with the ball bouncing in front of him. He shot towards goal, but it was straight at Jersey's 'keeper Euan Van der Vliet.

Jersey would fully take control of the game in the 35th minute. Rai Dos Santos again stood over a free kick on Jersey's left hand side. He delivered an excellent cross into the box, this was initially headed clear by the Camberley defence. The clearance landed perfectly to Jonny Le Quesne in a central position on the edge of the box. Le Quesne powerfully fired low, striking the ball through the crowded penalty area, nestling it into the bottom right corner. The lead was nothing more than the Bulls deserved after a strong first half showing.

The second half in the same fashion as the first. Jersey launched an attack within the opening minute of the second half. Toby Ritzema found a cross from the left to Paul McKay, his effort being blocked by the Camberley defence.

A flurry of yellow cards for Camberley would follow, with both Kay Conteh and Jacob Wheeler being booked for cynical fouls to prevent promising Jersey attacks. Conteh would be involved again in the 64th minute. A corner from the ever-dangerous Jersey left was misjudged by West in the Camberley goal. Luke Campbell of Jersey would react fastest, poking an effort from the 6-yard box towards a seemingly unguarded net. This would turn out not to be the case. Kay Conteh heroically reached out a foot, diverting the ball cannoning off the post and out of danger.

The post would again come to Camberley's rescue in the 73rd minute. Ritzema was the danger man again. He did well to pinch the ball off a defender before driving into the left of the area. He fired low towards goal, seeing his effort rebound back off the foot of the post.

Camberley would attack one last time in the match. A ball forward was missed by the Jersey defence allowing substitute Billy Murphy an opportunity to run at goal. The Jersey defence recovered well, not letting Murphy get any sort of attempt at goal.

Jersey would continue to push for more goals before full time, however a second goal would not arrive for them. The full time whistle arrived, condemning Camberley to their second successive 1-0 defeat. The result keeps Jersey Bulls in touching distance with the top of the table.

The club was established in 1895 after a discussion at St Michael's church, and was originally named St Michael's Foot-ball Club, although they became known as St Michael's, Camberley.

The first match, a friendly, was played on 16 October against D Company from the Royal Military College in nearby Sandhurst, St Michael's won 4–2. In January 1896 they joined the Surrey County Football Association, entering and winning the Surrey Junior Cup in 1897–98; the club's first competitive game was played on 16 October 1897, a Junior Cup first round match against Farncombe which St Michael's won 5–2. After winning the cup, the club joined the East & West Surrey League for the 1898–99 season.

In January 1901 a public meeting was held, at which it was decided to establish a new club that would absorb both St Michael's and Camberley Magpies. The name Camberley & Yorktown was adopted and the club took St Michael's place in the East & West Surrey League. However, they dropped into the Aldershot Combination in 1902, before switching to the Ascot & District League in 1903. The club finished as runners-up in their first season and went on to win the league in 1904–05. They were runners-up again in 1905–06, before winning a hat-trick of successive titles in 1907–08, 1908–09 and 1909–10, remaining unbeaten throughout the third of the title-winning seasons. The season also saw them win the Surrey Junior Cup for a second time, beating Sutton United 2–0 in the final. In 1910 Camberley & Yorktown returned to the East & West Surrey League, which had been renamed the West

Surrey League. In 1912–13 the club also entered the three-club Aldershot Senior Civilian League, which they won. They went on to win the West Surrey League the following season.

In 1922 Camberley & Yorktown were founder members of the Surrey Senior League. They won three successive titles in 1930–31, 1931–32 and 1932–33 and were runners-up in 1938–39. After World War II the club was renamed Camberley, and were Surrey Senior League runners-up in 1946–47, before winning the league's Charity Cup in 1951–52 with a 4–3 win over Chertsey Town. The club were league runners-up again in 1961–62, and adopted their current name on 2 June 1967 after merging with former Parthenon League club

Camberley Wanderers. In 1973 they joined the Spartan League, but left to join Division Two of the Athenian League in 1975. In 1977 they switched to Division Two of the Isthmian League, and were promoted to Division One after finishing as Division Two runners-up in 1978–79. Two seasons later they were relegated, and after a single season back in Division Two, they rejoined the Athenian League, which now had a single division.

In 1983 Rick Wakeman became the club's chairman while he was living in Camberley. He remained in this post until 1986 when he was elected Vice-President, and left the club when he moved to the Isle of Man in 1988. In 1984 the Athenian League disbanded; Camberley rejoined the Isthmian League and were placed in Division Two South, where they remained until being placed in Division Three following league reorganisation in 1991. In 1998–99 the club reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time. Drawn against away to Third Division Brentford, they lost 5–0. Division Three became Division Two in 2002, and Camberley remained members until the end of the 2005–06 season, when they dropped into the Premier Division of the Combined Counties League through the FA's re-structuring of non-league football. They were runners-up in the division in 2013–14 and 2014–15.

They came third in the 2015-16 season in the North division of the Combined counties league 2016-17 saw a sixth place finish and seventh the season after. 2018-19 saw a sixteenth place finish and with the 2019-20 season not finishing and the 2020-21 one not even starting due to covid, they started the 2021-22 season in the Combined Counties Premier Division South and Manager Luke Turkington oversaw a twelfth place finish on 44 points. 2022-23 Season was an improvement on the previous finishing tenth with 52 Points, with a fantastic run of 1 defeat in the last 14 league games of the season, that was at a time when games were coming thick and fast as the season had to be extended by 2 weeks to make up for the bad weather earlier in the campaign. 2023-24 was a disappointing season which was entered into with the hope to push on from the prior years and maybe see if we could get in the top 5 for the newly instigated playoffs.

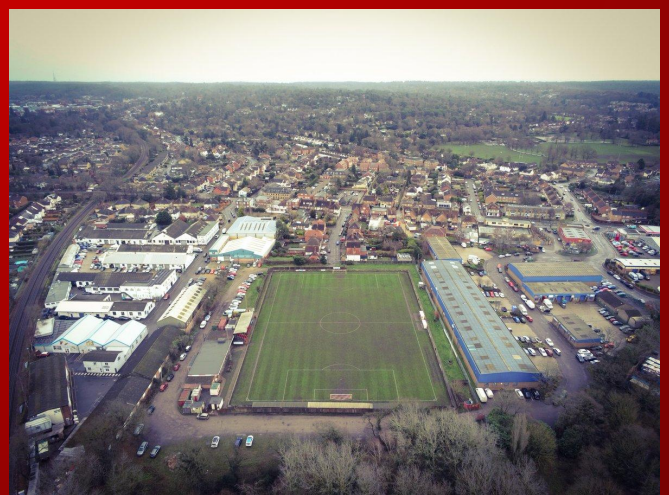
GROUND

In 1898 the club started playing at the new Recreation Ground on London Road, although they also used a pitch near Southwell Park Road when the Recreation Ground was unavailable and had moved there permanently by 1905. They played there until moving to Martin's Meadow in 1909. However, when the tenancy came to an end, the club returned to the Recreation Ground.

Since 1923 the club have played at Krooner Park on Wilton Road. The ground was paid for with the winnings of a horse named Krooner who won two races at Haydock Park Racecourse in 1920.

It was officially opened on 22 December 1923. Due to financial difficulties Krooner Park was sold back to the local council in 1939 with the council guaranteeing that the ground would be retained in perpetuity and that it would be rented to the football club, giving them priority whilst they remained in existence. In the mid-1960s the club asked the council to leave Krooner Park and build a new ground at South-cote Park Farm, but the request was rejected due to the amount of engineering that would be required.

Floodlights were installed at the ground in 1974, with the first floodlit match being a friendly against Crystal Palace on 14 October. The attendance at the match, which ended in a 1–1 draw, was around 3,100, a ground record. The highest confirmed attendance at Krooner Park was 2,066 when the newly-formed Aldershot Town visited for an Isthmian League Division Three match on 10 November 1992.

Balham Football Club was formed in 2011 in order to provide player progression into open age football for the hugely talented, high achieving age group teams of Balham Blazers FC, which was founded by Greg Cruttwell in 2001.

Having won back-to-back promotions in 2011/12 and 2012/13 Balham did the league and cup double in the Surrey South Eastern Combination in 2013/14.

In 2014/15 Balham finished in a promotion position again, in the Surrey Elite Intermediate Football League, however promotion was denied due to Combined Counties League facility requirements not being met.

Having moved to ground share with Cobham FC, in order to meet the facility requirements, Balham finished as runners up in the SEIFL in 2015/16 and as a result were promoted to Division One of the Combined Counties League for the 2016/17 season.

The club had an exceptional first league campaign at Step 6, finishing in a promotion position for the sixth consecutive season and winning the London Senior Trophy.

In 2017/18 the club had an equally exceptional season, finishing 5th at Step 5 in the Premier Division of the CCL and winning the London Senior Cup.

2021/22 will be the club's fifth season at this level after flirting with relegation in 2018/19 and then having null and void seasons in 2019/20 and 2020/21 due to COVID-19.

Having begun on Wimbledon Extension, before moving to Cobham and then to the Wibbandune Stadium, where the club ground shared with Colliers Wood Utd, Balham were on the move again in 2020, this time to the Mayfield Stadium, where the club has embarked on a two-year ground share agreement with AFC Croydon Athletic.

Moving location meant having to move sideways in the Football League Pyramid, from the Premier Division of the CCL into the Premier Division of the SCEFL (South East Counties Football League) After one single season in the SCEFL however, which was curtailed due to COVID-19, the FA have brought Balham back to the Combined Counties League for the 2021/22 season, at the same level, in a newly formed Premier League South.

The 21/22 season we were back in the Combined Counties League Premier South – and great to play against some of the teams we have faced many times before as well as some new ones. Despite it being our second highest finish in the division, we couldn't find consistency, there was a notable effort in the Surrey FA Senior Cup where we reached the semi-final but lost to National League side Dorking Wanderers.

Since returning the club has finished 8th in the league in 2021/22 and 9th in 2022/23, a season in which The Blazers (Balham's club nickname) were also Southern Combination Cup Runners Up. Balham flirted with the play-offs for much of 23/24 season but a dip in form towards the end saw them finish 9th in the end.

Mister Two Billion

When asked who the first million pound man was, everyone would confidently answer that it was Trevor Francis, who moved from Birmingham City to Nottingham Forest in 1979, and scored the goal that won Brian Clough his first European Cup. But, notwithstanding the fact that Clough insisted he had paid £1 less than the milestone figure, the first million pound man wasn't English, and made his move some four years before Francis. And when Giuseppe Savoldi made the move to a title-challenging Napoli, he didn't earn a million pound moniker. With the Italian Lira so much weaker than the pound, he became known as Mister Two Billion.

For Savoldi, childhood nearly took him on a very different path. Tall and athletic, his first love wasn't football, but basketball. Pushed onto the football pitch at the same time, he spent his teenage years splitting his time between the sports before, at the age of eighteen, dedicating himself to the one that offered the best chance of a career. In 1965, he made his debut for Atalanta.

In truth, he had been on their books for a few years previous to that. They were his biggest local club, and the aerial prowess he had developed in basketball made him stand out in their youth ranks. His leaping ability also made him a promising high jumper, and he was a prized asset. Without Atalanta's knowledge, he continued to play basketball in secret until Hungarian youth coach Mikhail Kinces convinced him to finally focus entirely on football.

Savoldi made his debut in the Italian Cup as a left winger, and scored in his first game against Vicenza. When Stefano Angelieri took over the reins a month later, he moved Savoldi to centre forward, and despite a slow start, Angelieri stuck with him. His first league goal came the following season, and Savoldi never looked back.

A series of solid performances over that season drew some admiring glances from bigger clubs across the league, but Savoldi chose to repay the faith Angelieri had shown in him and stay with Atalanta for a third season. His burgeoning talent was unable to lift his hometown side above mid-table, but he established himself as the brightest young talent in Italy. In 1968, with his title-winning ambitions limited in Bergamo, he made the difficult decision to move on. Bologna would be his new home, but success was only limited with I Rossoblu.

Savoldi spent seven years with Bologna, building his reputation but struggling for the silverware he craved, despite winning the Italian Cup twice. Over the course of his time with the club, he scored 140 goals and was twice the top scorer in the Italian Cup, as well as sharing the Capocannoniere in 1973 with Gianni Rivera and Paolo Pulici. He is Bologna's fourth top scorer of all time, but by 1975 the same frustrations had started to appear that he had experienced at Atalanta, namely the lack of a league title.

That summer, he was unable to force through a move to Helenio Herrera's Roma, or to Milan or Juventus who had also expressed an interest. But it was clear that he wanted to leave, and Napoli had finished third in 1974, and second in 1975. They appeared to be a club on the up, and he believed he could be the final piece of the puzzle. The Neapolitans made an eye-watering bid of two billion lira, and Bologna gave Savoldi his wish. He moved south, ready to compete for the title but with the price tag hanging around his neck. Unbeknownst to him, Napoli were already in decline following their high point the previous season.

Despite a solid return of 77 goals over his four years in Naples, the team slowly slid down the table. Injuries cost him a bright start at the club, and in his first season they finished fifth, just two places ahead of Bologna. 'I arrived in Naples too late', he would later lament. Napoli were at the end of a cycle, not the beginning of one, and the Scudetto slipped away from them. Savoldi added another cup medal to his collection, but in 1977 they slipped back further to ninth. Sixth and seventh placed finished followed before, frustrated with the failure, he moved back to Bologna. Eleven goals helped them to seventh, three places ahead of Napoli.

Savoldi's career ended with a black spot against his name. In the summer of 1980 he was accused of leading an underground betting ring and, after a long hearing, he was slapped with a three year suspension. It was reduced to two years on appeal, but it was the writing on the wall. At 34, he made his comeback for Atalanta, but with two years out of the game and his aging legs, he struggled to keep up with his younger opponents. He managed just one goal, before hanging up his boots for good.

Unlike his contemporary Trevor Francis, he never scaled the heights of European football. But he was the first million pound man, regardless of Clough's insinuations. His career shows that, whatever the price tag, success is never guaranteed.
